1 MR. JACQUEZ: We still have a few people
2 signing in.

3 On behalf of the Dona Ana Water Board, okay,
4 we'd like to welcome everybody. Thank you for showing up.
5 If you think that we -- or I look a little shaky and
6 stuff, it is. This is the first time we come before so
7 many members. But thank you for the interest. That's a
8 very, very positive thing for us because that's what we've
9 always been shooting for is to have active participation.
10 Okay. We'd like to go ahead and start.

11 Is the agenda up?

12 MS. HORTON: You know how to work that
13 machine? Would you like to? I have no idea how to work
14 it. We rented it so I --

15 MR. JACQUEZ: We also need a
16 parliamentarian. The guy that said "Shut up" a little
17 while ago that would work. We could hire that guy.

18 Okay. Thank you. Sound better? Okay.

19 We're running a little bit late. Somebody
20 give me a time.

21 MS. HORTON: Seven o'clock.

22 MR. JACQUEZ: At seven o'clock, okay,
23 officially we'll call the meeting to order.

24 Rosanne.

25 MR. CROWLEY: Mr. Chairman, point of order.

1 Can you all hear me?

2 AUDIENCE: Yeah.

3 MR. CROWLEY: Point of order and question of
4 privilege affecting this assembly. In particular to the
5 conduct of officers and employees --

6 MR. PETERS: Mr. Crowley --

7 MR. CROWLEY: -- and to the accuracy of
8 published reports and proceedings.

9 MR. PETERS: In order to make a proper
10 transcript of this proceeding, would you go to the
11 microphone and state your name so we can get that down on
12 the record.

13 MR. CROWLEY: I will do that.

14 I just made a point of order. My name is
15 Bob Crowley and I'm a member.

16 We have questions as to whether this meeting
17 can proceed absent clarification of what the bylaws of the
18 water company are and who are its duly elected board
19 members.

20 Mr. Chairman, if you'll allow me to
21 continue, I'd like to read a statement into the record as
22 I want no uncertainty as to what I said. I'm also giving
23 each board member -- or you will get one -- each board
24 member, the meeting recorder, selected members of the
25 audience and the medias a copy of my statement with

1 exhibits.

2 I represent a group of members that believes
3 that the meeting cannot proceed due to several
4 irregularities that have occurred since October 2013.
5 This meeting cannot proceed until we know what the correct
6 bylaws of the water company are that will govern this
7 meeting and who the valid directors are to sit at this
8 meeting. Specifically, first the bylaws that were amended
9 at the November 7, 2013, special members' meeting are
10 invalid for three reasons.

11 Reason one. We believe that there was an
12 Open Meetings Act violation since there was no vote to
13 approve minutes of the January 2013 meeting as required by
14 law. This fact was pointed out to the board during the
15 meeting and the meeting continued anyway. In my package
16 if the board -- when the board gets it, it's Exhibit 1-A.

17 Reason two. The water company has been
18 unable to produce proof of a quorum at this November 7th
19 meeting, Exhibit 1-B.

20 Reason number three, and most importantly,
21 the November 7 meeting notice mailed out October 25th,
22 2013, to 3,131 members contained proposed bylaw language
23 to be voted on at the November 7th meeting. That's
24 Exhibit 1-C. However, the proposed bylaw language
25 distributed and actually voted on at the meeting was

1 materially different than what was previously mailed out
2 to the entire membership. I'm going to repeat that for
3 you. The proposed bylaws language distributed and
4 actually voted on at meeting was materially different than
5 what was previously mailed out to the entire membership.

6 MR. PETERS: Mr. Crowley, let me interrupt
7 you here. My name is Lee Peters. I'm counsel for the
8 association. You've raised a point of order that is to
9 raise an issue in the rules. You are going far beyond
10 that and raising issues of --

11 MR. CROWLEY: I raised a question of
12 privilege. I raised a question of privilege.

13 MR. PETERS: I did not interrupt you.
14 Please don't interrupt me. Okay? Point of order is
15 regarding rules that the meeting is to be held under. You
16 are raising legal issues that have been raised by your
17 counsel and have been addressed and they go far beyond a
18 point of order at this meeting.

19 MR. CROWLEY: I did not. I raised a point
20 of order and a question of privilege.

21 MR. PETERS: And are -- you're going to read
22 a speech into the record. There'll be a time --

23 MR. CROWLEY: I have about two pages.

24 MR. PETERS: There'll be a time for you
25 to -- to put that in the record. If you want to put it in

1 in written form or read it, there'll be a time for that.

2 But your point of order is out of line.

3 MR. CROWLEY: All right. Then I have a
4 question of privilege then. I -- I read my question of
5 privilege. That stops the meeting.

6 MR. PETERS: What is your point of
7 privilege?

8 MR. CROWLEY: I just read it to you.

9 MR. PETERS: Okay. You're done. Thank you.
10 Please sit down.

11 MR. CROWLEY: No, I'm not. Now I'm -- now
12 I'm telling you what the conduct is.

13 MR. JACQUEZ: No. A point of order is not
14 debatable, you're debating the point.

15 MR. CROWLEY: I'm not debating a point of
16 order.

17 MR. JACQUEZ: You're out of order,
18 Mr. Crowley.

19 MR. CROWLEY: I would like to take a vote of
20 the people here --

21 MR. JACQUEZ: You're out of order,
22 Mr. Crowley.

23 MR. CROWLEY: -- as to whether they want me
24 to continue or not to point out the transgressions that
25 took place in the last 60, 90, 120, 180 days.

1 MR. JACQUEZ: Mr. Crowley, you're --

2 UNIDENTIFIED AUDIENCE MEMBER: Continue.

3 MR. JACQUEZ: -- you're out of order.

4 (Audience discussion off the stenographic
5 record.)

6 MR. JACQUEZ: As the chair I expect -- we
7 never got to the chance of a little bit of behavior.
8 Please conduct yourself appropriately. There's no need
9 for yelling and screaming.

10 Mr. Crowley, we'd be glad to give you some
11 time if you need it and we'll give it to you under public
12 input. Okay?

13 MR. CROWLEY: I guess so as long as that's
14 on the record. Thank you.

15 MR. JACQUEZ: Okay. And I remind you that
16 we do have an agenda. Let's get through this and then if
17 we need to deal with other things, other information,
18 we'll be glad to do it. Okay? We want this to be a
19 productive meeting. We want this meeting to be
20 constructive. We don't want to divide people up. We
21 don't want to -- this place to turn into a yelling and
22 screaming place. Okay? So please assist the chair with
23 that and the board.

24 Proof of notice of the meeting. Jennifer?

25 MS. HORTON: You want it?

1 MR. JACQUEZ: Just report.

2 MS. HORTON: Yeah, it's been mailed. It was
3 mailed by Go Direct.

4 HEARING OFFICER: So it was -- it was done?
5 Okay. Thank you, Jennifer.

6 We'll move on to proof of quorum.

7 Rosanne, number that we needed for a quorum.

8 MS. BALDERRAMA: 41.

9 MR. JACQUEZ: 41. Do we have a quorum?

10 MS. BALDERRAMA: We do.

11 MR. JACQUEZ: We do.

12 Secretary/treasurer, do you verify that we
13 have a quorum?

14 SECRETARY: We do.

15 UNIDENTIFIED AUDIENCE MEMBER: How many do
16 we have? We want to know.

17 MR. JACQUEZ: Let her get finished. The
18 quorum that we accomplished was 41. We needed to have
19 that and we did it. We'll get a total here in a minute.
20 You know, we've got a lot of people, let us get that
21 total.

22 Rosanne, as soon as you get that total,
23 please let me know.

24 Okay. We'll move on to introductions.

25 Okay. Board of directors. Jim Melton, Kay

1 Trujillo, Aggie Balizan, Emma Garcia. Our attorney Lee
2 Peters, association attorney. Jennifer Horton, executive
3 director.

4 Okay. We'll move on to the procedures.

5 The procedures conducted at this meeting,
6 these will be set agenda items only discussion -- only
7 discussed individually as listed on the agenda. The chair
8 will recognize the agenda items, call for a motion to
9 accept the agenda on the item, call for a second. Any
10 agenda item for discussion -- I'm sorry -- the second --
11 after the second it is open for discussion. Okay? So by
12 saying that we need a motion for the agenda item and a
13 second, a discussion comes afterwards. Okay? After
14 discussion the vote for the agenda item will be taken.

15 Voting. We can do acclamation, show of
16 hands, voice or ballot. Acclamation. If anyone disagrees
17 we'll go to the ballots. Okay? And we have a procedure
18 in place for that.

19 The ballots. I need to announce that we
20 have them. I would like to request the membership. We
21 might -- our procedure is if we have an item, we go and we
22 have to sign, receive our ballots, bring them back and
23 vote and then count. We have several items. If they do
24 not pass, then they will have to be brought for a vote.
25 With your permission we'd like to discuss them and then

1 vote for them all together on the ballot. Okay? If they
2 don't pass, then they don't pass; if they pass they pass.
3 Is that agreeable with everybody?

4 UNIDENTIFIED AUDIENCE MEMBER: Are you
5 saying you're going to vote on all of these at one time?

6 MR. JACQUEZ: If you have something -- I
7 haven't gotten to the procedure about the microphone,
8 ma'am. If you have anything to say, you guys, you need to
9 approach the mic, state your name, member/nonmember, and
10 then whatever your -- your question is.

11 UNIDENTIFIED AUDIENCE MEMBER: Clarify,
12 please.

13 MR. JACQUEZ: For voting. We have several
14 items to vote on. We can vote on them individually and
15 it'll take a long time. Our procedure is we go and get a
16 ballot, sign for it, we vote, pick up the ballots, count
17 the ballots and then give the results of the vote. Okay?
18 I'm asking, with your permission, if we have several items
19 to vote for, if we can go through the items and then come
20 back and vote for them individually on the ballot, you
21 will have -- if it's three things, you will vote for three
22 different ones "yea" or "nay." You want to vote for them
23 that way? It makes it easier. If not we'll be here
24 forever. If not we can vote for them individually if you
25 want.

1 UNIDENTIFIED AUDIENCE MEMBER: Individually.

2 MR. JACQUEZ: You need to come up, please.

3 I hate to make it an inconvenience, you guys.

4 Rosanne, what's the count?

5 MS. BALDERRAMA: 118.

6 MR. JACQUEZ: 118.

7 I'm sorry. Go ahead.

8 MS. TOM-NELSON: Point of clarification. My
9 name is Cheryl Tom-Nelson. I'm a member. I still -- can
10 you not hear me. All right. Point of clarification. I'm
11 still not understanding. Are you saying that these
12 ballots that you have have all of the items on them and
13 that every item is voted for individually, but we would be
14 discussing them before you hand out the ballot --

15 MR. JACQUEZ: Yes.

16 MS. TOM-NELSON: -- so that we discuss all
17 of them? So the question you're asking is -- or the --
18 the approval you're asking us to do is say can we do all
19 the discussion before we go line up to get the ballots.
20 Is that correct?

21 MR. JACQUEZ: Yes. To vote on one ballot
22 instead of having to vote on four different ballots.

23 MS. TOM-NELSON: But are all of the
24 questions on the same ballot?

25 MR. JACQUEZ: Yes.

1 Well, I stand corrected. Two for the
2 minutes -- one ballot for the minutes and one for the open
3 meeting and the bylaws. So we're going to vote twice.
4 I'm sorry. I misunderstood.

5 MS. TOM-NELSON: Okay. So then what you're
6 asking us to do is discuss everything at once and then --

7 MR. JACQUEZ: Individually and then go on to
8 the next one.

9 MS. TOM-NELSON: And then we would -- then
10 we would get two ballots or how does that -- how are you
11 planning to do this, please?

12 MR. JACQUEZ: Okay. We'll talk about the
13 minutes, get a ballot. And then we'll come back with the
14 amendments, bylaws and then go from there.

15 MS. TOM-NELSON: And get a second ballot.

16 MR. JACQUEZ: Get a second ballot.

17 MS. TOM-NELSON: So -- so when you're asking
18 us to line up twice instead of --

19 MR. JACQUEZ: Possibly five times. Is that
20 agreeable?

21 MS. TOM-NELSON: That -- that's my question.
22 That's my clarification, I needed --

23 MR. JACQUEZ: I'm sorry. I didn't explain
24 it clear enough for you.

25 Is that acceptable with everybody?

1 UNIDENTIFIED AUDIENCE MEMBER: No. Line up
2 five times?

3 What's wrong with a hand vote?

4 MR. JACQUEZ: Yes, sir.

5 MR. PONTERI: My name is Ray Ponteri and I'm
6 also a member.

7 I believe under Robert's Rule of Order, each
8 item has to be handled separately in a separate vote and I
9 understand that would be a time-consuming process,
10 especially if you do it by a written ballot. I think an
11 alternative to that might be where there's a show of hands
12 and an accurate count made. That would certainly save a
13 lot of time with everybody as a member -- a member. But I
14 completely oppose to lumping minutes together and having
15 one vote on it and lumping bylaws together. In the Open
16 Meetings Act, I think they're separate issues with those
17 items and I think the votes have to be taken individually.

18 MR. JACQUEZ: Okay. Well, we have a choice.
19 He brings up a point, but I think we understand already
20 that every item we're voting on is on an individual basis.
21 Every one of them, whether they be five or three, whatever
22 they are, and then we go from there with the one ballot --
23 or two ballots. If you want to do it for every one, I'm
24 just asking you. We thought it'd be convenient, expedite
25 the situation. One of the things I haven't addressed with

1 you yet is the occupancy of this building. We are
2 scheduled here until ten o'clock. Okay? And this is not
3 our rules. This is a public school rule and we are only
4 scheduled until ten o'clock. So to expedite things that's
5 the recommendation or suggestion to you.

6 How do you want to do this? Show of hands?
7 Okay. Here are the ballots. Well, we're just trying to
8 do things right, okay, and expedite things. We're not
9 trying to do anything wrong. They're legible.

10 Okay. Is that the consensus then?

11 MR. HAYHOE: One other clarification, if you
12 would, please. My name is Jim Hayhoe. And when we get to
13 the minutes, we will be discussing each one separately.
14 Does the ballot contain an up and down on both minutes
15 together or does the ballot contain a separate vote for
16 each one of the minutes?

17 MR. JACQUEZ: We've got the ballot here.
18 They're separate.

19 Ma'am -- ma'am, did you want to say
20 something? The lady that came up.

21 MS. GLAZIER: My name is Sharon Glazier. I
22 am also a member. I wanted to point out in the minutes it
23 indicates in about paragraph 3 that they will be approved
24 by voice vote. It's in their writing. But the show of
25 hands, I think, is appropriate.

1 MR. JACQUEZ: It's just that we have some
2 choices. We have welcomed everybody, members and
3 nonmembers, so it's hard to detect who votes and who
4 doesn't vote, but we can do it that way.

5 You prefer to do it by hands?

6 AUDIENCE: Yes.

7 MR. JACQUEZ: Okay. Those that want to vote
8 individually, raise their hand. Individually the two
9 ballots?

10 Okay. Would you please stand so we can see
11 tags. Somebody count.

12 UNIDENTIFIED AUDIENCE MEMBER: We don't know
13 what we're voting on.

14 MR. JACQUEZ: You said you wanted to vote
15 individually for each item. That's what you said and
16 that's what we're voting for.

17 (Audience discussion off the stenographic
18 record.)

19 MR. JACQUEZ: Hold on. We've got a question
20 about this. We're trying to do it right so everybody is
21 happy. Please be seated.

22 (Audience discussion off the stenographic
23 record.)

24 MR. JACQUEZ: Jennifer, can you explain it
25 to everybody. Maybe you'll do a better job of it.

1 MS. HORTON: I can try.

2 Hi, I'm Jennifer Horton with Dona Ana
3 Mutual, I'm the executive director here.

4 What we are attempting to do is have you
5 vote by ballots. On the ballots, the first one you would
6 receive is the blue one. On this blue ballot are both
7 sets of minutes, the January 30th, 2013, and the November
8 7th, 2013. There is a "yes" and "no" box for each set of
9 minutes. You would not -- you're not being asked to vote
10 lump sum for both at the same time. You can check "yes"
11 for one and "no" for another; "no" for both, "yes" for
12 both. It's completely up to you.

13 The pink ballot is for the three items under
14 new business, the resolution and the two articles in the
15 bylaws. Again those are separate line items and you can
16 vote "yes" for one, "no" for two, "yes" for two, "no" for
17 one and you get to vote on individual items. It's just
18 one ballot for the pink one for the three items under new
19 business and one ballot for the minutes, but they are
20 separate votes for each five items. Is that clear?

21 AUDIENCE: Yes.

22 MS. HORTON: The way you will dispense
23 ballots is we will call you up by alphabetical group and
24 that alphabetical group will get their ballot, the first
25 one, the blue one, and you'll go vote. Then second group,

1 while the first group is voting, will get their ballots.
2 So it's not chaotic in the back and not all 100 people
3 rush back there, we'll pull you in small groups and
4 everyone will cast a vote. We'll count them. Then you'll
5 discuss these items under new business. Again you'll go
6 back and get your second ballot and you'll cast your vote
7 in small groups and then that will be the end of the
8 ballots.

9 Is that clearer for everyone?

10 AUDIENCE: Yes.

11 MS. HORTON: Yes? Are we good with ballots?

12 UNIDENTIFIED AUDIENCE MEMBER: Can you
13 clarify who gets to vote.

14 MS. HORTON: Okay. I've been asked to
15 clarify who votes. Members vote. So if there are two of
16 you in your household, one person votes. There is one
17 person per household because one meter, one vote. But if
18 you have 30 meters, you still get one vote because it's
19 one membership.

20 Are we good?

21 MR. PETERS: Let me add something else to
22 the right to vote. It is our interpretation that your
23 vote here on the items on the agenda is subject to secret
24 ballot. Anybody who objects to doing voting by
25 acclamation or voice vote or standing up or raising hands,

1 if there's any objection to that, then we go to the
2 ballot. Okay? The chair may ask for an individual item
3 to be moved by acclamation. If there's no objection, we
4 can be done with that one. And those that are
5 controversial, then we'll go to the ballot and you'll mark
6 the ballot. So you may not have to mark everything on
7 your ballot, if something is already passed by
8 acclamation.

9 MS. HORTON: Yes, sir. Could I get you to
10 come to the microphone so that you can state your name for
11 the record and we can hear your statement.

12 MR. ELLINS: Yes. Hi, you guys. My name is
13 Lynn Ellins. I'm a member. May I suggest -- I have --
14 what?

15 MS. HORTON: They can't hear you.

16 MR. ELLINS: How's that?

17 I have never been to a meeting where we have
18 taken a secret vote to approve minutes. I would suggest
19 that we approve the minutes of January 30th, 2013, by
20 acclamation. After we've done that, I would approve the
21 minutes of November 7th by acclamation. Then we can get
22 on with the meeting. We don't need to wait to distribute
23 ballots to vote on minutes that have already been printed
24 and distributed. Unless somebody here is going to object
25 to something in the minutes, wants to amend them or

1 correct them, you do that and then you vote. Thank you.

2 MS. HORTON: Thank you, Mr. Ellins.

3 MR. JACQUEZ: Ma'am?

4 MS. GLAZIER: This is Sharon Glazier again.

5 I would like to move that we approve both sets of these

6 minutes by acclamation and a show of hands.

7 All in favor or give a second, please.

8 UNIDENTIFIED AUDIENCE MEMBER: Second.

9 MR. JACQUEZ: Hold on. Ms. Glazier, hold
10 on.

11 UNIDENTIFIED AUDIENCE MEMBER: You cannot do
12 this.

13 MR. JACQUEZ: I'm in charge and I -- and I
14 will be glad to do that. If you entertain the motion, I
15 will make it. Okay?

16 UNIDENTIFIED AUDIENCE MEMBER: You almost
17 lost control there.

18 MR. JACQUEZ: No -- hey, I really appreciate
19 somebody that has the gall to come up here and do that.
20 And thank you, ma'am. I really do. Okay?

21 Well, we discussed it. Is everybody in
22 agreement? If not I'll call for a motion to accept voting
23 by the ballots.

24 But we're not there yet, Lee.

25 (Audience discussion off the stenographic

1 record.)

2 MR. JACQUEZ: Hold on, ma'am.

3 We've jumped a little bit on the agenda --

4 UNIDENTIFIED AUDIENCE MEMBER: Yeah.

5 MR. JACQUEZ: -- and that's what's thrown us
6 off a little bit, okay, an agreement on this. Do you mind
7 if we delay the motion to accept these while I finish up
8 the procedures and that gets us where we need to be? Is
9 that okay?

10 Ma'am, did you want to say something?

11 MS. BLACK: Well, you -- you just said it.
12 I said we're fighting over minutes and approvals and we
13 are not even into the business portion of the meeting.
14 We're still on introduction and procedures and
15 acknowledgment.

16 MS. HORTON: Can you give your name. Can
17 you give your name.

18 MS. BLACK: Lynne Black. I'm a member. But
19 let's hold it to the meeting that it is. We are not even
20 into business yet and we have just wasted 30 minutes here
21 fighting over stuff that has not even come up yet or
22 shouldn't have come up yet.

23 MR. JACQUEZ: We need to get there on the
24 agenda first. Let me finish what we need to finish. We
25 are at introductions, acknowledgments and procedures.

1 That's what's gotten us in trouble a little bit because
2 you haven't -- we have not had the opportunity to cover
3 those.

4 UNIDENTIFIED AUDIENCE MEMBER: Then do it.

5 MR. JACQUEZ: I'm trying.

6 Okay. I left it off with chair will
7 recognize individuals addressing the agenda item.
8 Required to speak in the microphone. Make sure you speak
9 loudly enough. The stenographer needs to hear you, okay,
10 and you need to state if you're a member, okay, or
11 nonmember.

12 Members approach the mic, state your name,
13 identify -- let me finish, please -- identify as an
14 association member or nonmember, address agenda item.
15 Limit -- we're going to -- we have, as I mentioned, a time
16 limit here so we're going to limit it to two minutes. If
17 you have a comment, please help us out with that. Okay?
18 Any meet- -- any members speaking for a group, identify as
19 such. Give list of members representing. Verbal is fine
20 again for the stenographer. Okay? And you pick up a
21 little bit more time. You pick up ten minutes of your
22 presentation if you want to do that. Okay?

23 Building time, like I told you, is at
24 10:00 p.m. We're okay with everything else. We thought
25 we might have some overflow, but we don't. The chair

1 reserves the right to limit comments on agenda items, if
2 repetitious or against -- the comments are against what
3 occurred. Okay? It is the interest of the chair to
4 conduct an orderly meeting. Please cooperate.

5 Public input. All discussions under the
6 items must be limited. To items not listed on the agenda,
7 that's the very, very last thing. Okay? We want
8 everybody to have a voice. Be considerate, please, and
9 this meeting will go a little bit smoother. Okay? I know
10 there's some confusion, but there's some confusion with us
11 because, also, we have not been involved with such a large
12 group before and that changes things for us. Okay? So
13 please be patient with us. All right? We'll move on to
14 the minutes.

15 We have a motion -- you want to restate that
16 motion again, ma'am.

17 MS. GLAZIER: Not really.

18 MR. JACQUEZ: In the effort of --

19 MS. GLAZIER: Sharon Glazier. I am a
20 member. I move for approval of the two sets of minutes
21 that are noted in the agenda by a show of hands, an
22 acclamation.

23 UNIDENTIFIED AUDIENCE MEMBER: Sharon,
24 you're not -- you're not clear. Are you saying to approve
25 both of them at once?

1 MR. JACQUEZ: That was the motion. To
2 accept both.

3 MS. GLAZIER: The motion was to accept both
4 sets of minutes --

5 UNIDENTIFIED AUDIENCE MEMBER: I second it.

6 MS. GLAZIER: -- as -- okay. Well, that's
7 the motion so you can vote on it.

8 MR. JACQUEZ: That's the motion. We have a
9 second.

10 UNIDENTIFIED AUDIENCE MEMBER: Second.

11 MS. HORTON: We need -- we need your name.

12 MR. JACQUEZ: You need to come up and
13 identify yourself, please, and second the motion.

14 MR. TRUJILLO: I'm Lionel Trujillo. I'm a
15 member. I second it.

16 MR. JACQUEZ: Okay. Thank you,
17 Mr. Trujillo.

18 We have a second.

19 UNIDENTIFIED AUDIENCE MEMBER: Discussion.

20 MR. JACQUEZ: We -- the motion included
21 acclamation -- by acclamation or show of hands.

22 UNIDENTIFIED AUDIENCE MEMBER: Isn't there a
23 discussion, sir?

24 MR. JACQUEZ: Okay. The motion said a show
25 of hands to the approval.

1 Go ahead, sir.

2 MR. HOKKANEN: We were going to be
3 afforded -- Jack Hokkanen, mar- -- member by marriage.

4 We were going to be given the opportunity by
5 ballot to vote on the minutes individually. I would like
6 to amend that motion to go ahead and approve by
7 acclamation by separate one for the January meeting and
8 one for the November.

9 UNIDENTIFIED AUDIENCE MEMBER: You've got to
10 vote the first one down first.

11 MR. JACQUEZ: The amendment. We have a
12 second -- okay.

13 (Audience discussion off the stenographic
14 record.)

15 MR. JACQUEZ: Okay. The amendment can be --
16 can be accepted.

17 MR. CROWLEY: Bob Crowley, member. I second
18 Jack Hokkanen's motion.

19 MR. JACQUEZ: Okay. Discussion on the
20 amendment.

21 Yes, sir.

22 MR. CORONA: My name is Richard Corona and
23 I'm a member. And do we have an opportunity to discuss
24 the minutes before we vote on them?

25 All right. I want to ask a question. On

1 the -- when do we have the opportunity to discuss the
2 minutes or amend the minutes?

3 MR. JACQUEZ: We need to deal with the
4 procedural --

5 MR. CORONA: But after we vote by
6 acclamation or otherwise, there will be no opportunity to
7 discuss the minutes or amend them. Correct?

8 MR. PETERS: We have a procedural motion to
9 amend as to the method by which we're going to vote on
10 this.

11 UNIDENTIFIED AUDIENCE MEMBER: Speak louder.
12 Speak up.

13 MR. PETERS: We have a procedural motion to
14 amend the pending motion and that motion to amend is to
15 separate out the two sets of minutes. That's a procedural
16 motion. Let's -- we need to vote on that and then move on
17 to the merits and discuss the -- the minutes, each set.

18 MR. CORONA: So we're only voting on how
19 we're going to do it?

20 MR. PETERS: Absol- -- right.

21 MR. CORONA: We're not voting on the minutes
22 themselves?

23 MR. PETERS: Not yet.

24 MR. CORONA: All right.

25 MR. PETERS: There'll be a full opportunity

1 to debate the minutes, each set of minutes, when we get to
2 that point.

3 MR. CORONA: All right.

4 UNIDENTIFIED AUDIENCE MEMBER: Call the
5 vote.

6 Call for a vote.

7 MR. JACQUEZ: Do you want to do it by hand?
8 Okay. We need a counter. Okay. Who are the counters?
9 You two guys, Rosanne and Jennifer.

10 Okay. We're voting on the amendment. Okay.
11 A vote of yes is that you will vote on each individual set
12 of minutes. A vote for no is to go back to the original
13 motion and to vote on both sets of minutes at the same
14 time.

15 UNIDENTIFIED AUDIENCE MEMBER: Please repeat
16 that.

17 MR. PETERS: The main motion is to consider
18 both sets of amendments at the same time. The amendment
19 to the motion, which we're voting on now, is to separate
20 those and have a vote on each set of minutes. A separate
21 vote on the January minutes, a separate vote on the
22 November minutes. So a vote "yes" right now is to
23 separate the two votes. A vote of "no" means you're going
24 to vote on them together.

25 MR. JACQUEZ: Got it?

1 (Audience discussion off the stenographic
2 record.)

3 UNIDENTIFIED AUDIENCE MEMBER: You have to
4 call for a vote.

5 MR. JACQUEZ: We are going to vote.

6 All in favor?

7 (Audience discussion off the stenographic
8 record.)

9 MR. JACQUEZ: Okay. "No" vote.

10 (Audience discussion off the stenographic
11 record.)

12 MR. JACQUEZ: Okay. Numbers for the "yes"?

13 MS. HORTON: 93.

14 MR. JACQUEZ: 93. Against?

15 MS. HORTON: 5.

16 MR. JACQUEZ: 5.

17 Amendment passes.

18 Okay. Now we need to move to the first
19 motion to vote on them individually.

20 (Audience discussion off the stenographic
21 record.)

22 MR. JACQUEZ: Is that understood? That's
23 where we're headed right now if everybody understands.

24 MR. ANDERSON: Curt Anderson, member. I
25 move approval of the minutes of January 30th, 2013, annual

1 meeting.

2 MR. JACQUEZ: We have a motion on the floor.

3 UNIDENTIFIED AUDIENCE MEMBER: I second.

4 MR. JACQUEZ: Second.

5 MS. HORTON: Who's the second?

6 MR. STEPRO: My name is Jerry Stepro,

7 member. I second the motion.

8 MR. JACQUEZ: Okay. We have a motion. Okay

9 discussion.

10 MR. ELLINS: Point of order, Mr. Chairman.

11 We don't need counters on that. The prerogative of the

12 chair is to call for the vote, "All those in favor?" you

13 look, you eyeball it. "All those against?" you eyeball

14 it. You can say, "In the opinion of the chair, the eyes

15 have it." You don't have to spend a lot of time counting

16 votes.

17 MR. JACQUEZ: Okay. Your name again, sir.

18 MR. ELLINS: Dean Ellins.

19 (Audience discussion off the stenographic

20 record.)

21 MR. JACQUEZ: That procedure is fine, if

22 there's no objections, but we want to get the numbers

23 right. Like I tell you we have some confusion because we

24 do have some nonmembers here and our intent is to get the

25 vote right. Discuss.

1 MR. CORONA: My name is Richard Corona
2 again. And I have a question about the January 30th
3 minutes. On public input. The floor was open for public
4 input, Mr. Harry Palmer asked about Hope Road and the
5 water treatment plant. That's great, but we need an
6 answer to the question recorded in the minutes. If you're
7 just going to put what is asked but not how it's answered,
8 then, in my opinion, the minutes are not complete. So I
9 would ask that either this be amended to -- to include the
10 answer to the question or that should be stricken
11 completely from the minutes. There was no answer to the
12 question. And I think in future minutes, if there is a
13 question posed, there should be an answer recorded.

14 MR. JACQUEZ: Okay.

15 MR. CORONA: That's -- that's my point.

16 MR. JACQUEZ: Okay. Any other discussion?

17 Call for vote. Okay. Here we go.

18 The motion is to approve the minutes of
19 January 30th, 2013, annual membership meeting. All in
20 favor raise your hand.

21 UNIDENTIFIED AUDIENCE MEMBER: Point of
22 clarification. Do the minutes include a response?

23 MR. JACQUEZ: There was no motion made so we
24 moved on to accepting it.

25 All in favor?

1 Counters.

2 (Audience discussion off the stenographic
3 record.)

4 MR. JACQUEZ: Okay. We had a motion to
5 accept minutes. The count?

6 Oh, I'm sorry. The nos. Against?

7 (Audience discussion off the stenographic
8 record.)

9 MR. JACQUEZ: The count is 84 yes; 11 nay.
10 Okay. So the minutes of January 30th, 2013,
11 annual membership meeting have been accepted. Okay?

12 We'll move on to the minutes of November
13 7th, 2013, special membership meeting. I need a motion to
14 accept the minutes.

15 UNIDENTIFIED AUDIENCE MEMBER: Of what?

16 MR. JACQUEZ: November 7th.

17 MR. MORROW: Kenny Morrow -- I'm sorry.

18 Kenny Morrow, member. I move to accept the
19 November 7, 2013, minutes as amended to include the
20 articles of incorporation and the bylaws adopted by the
21 membership at the November 7, 2013, meeting be attached
22 and included in the minutes of the meeting.

23 MR. JACQUEZ: Okay. May I have a second.

24 MR. ANDERSON: Curt Anderson, you have a
25 second.

1 MR. JACQUEZ: Okay. We have a motion and a
2 second.

3 UNIDENTIFIED AUDIENCE MEMBER: What's the
4 motion?

5 MR. JACQUEZ: The motion is to accept.

6 MS. HORTON: These are men- -- these are the
7 amendments he asked for.

8 MR. JACQUEZ: The motion is to accept the
9 minutes of -- what's the date? -- November 7th and we have
10 a second. Discussion? As amended.

11 UNIDENTIFIED AUDIENCE MEMBER: Well, you
12 have to read what he said amendment -- what amendments he
13 said.

14 MR. JACQUEZ: If that's your request, we'll
15 be glad to do it.

16 MR. HAYHOE: My name is Jim Hayhoe. With
17 regards --

18 UNIDENTIFIED AUDIENCE MEMBER: Louder.

19 MR. HAYHOE: My name is Jim Hayhoe. With
20 regards to the minutes -- discussion of the minutes of
21 November 7th, first of all we started to have a point of
22 order at the beginning of the meeting and that's been
23 deferred to public input. I would request that we defer
24 the approval of the minutes of the November 7th meeting
25 until after public input and we've had an opportunity to

1 hear the issues associated with the November 7th meeting
2 and I would so make -- make a motion so made.

3 MR. CROWLEY: My name is Bob Crowley,
4 member, and I second it.

5 MR. JACQUEZ: We have a motion and a second
6 to defer until after the public input. Do we vote? Any
7 discussion?

8 MS. BLACK: Mr. President, Lynne Black,
9 member. I don't understand why we need to defer to this.
10 We can open up these minutes for discussion before he
11 calls for the question. Any questions you have on the
12 minutes can be asked now. If there's a problem with those
13 minutes, then I'm not sure this meeting is not out of
14 order.

15 MR. JACQUEZ: Any further discussion?

16 MR. ANDERSON: Mr. Chairman, Curt Anderson,
17 member. I think -- I believe --

18 UNIDENTIFIED AUDIENCE MEMBER: Louder.
19 Start over.

20 MR. JACQUEZ: Please don't yell. If you
21 can't hear, just raise your hand, we'll be glad to
22 instruct the -- the person up front.

23 MR. ANDERSON: Curt Anderson, member. I'll
24 defer to parliamentarian, but I believe we have to vote on
25 the first motion which has been seconded first before we

1 vote on this thing to defer.

2 MR. PETERS: Lee Peters, counsel for the
3 association.

4 UNIDENTIFIED AUDIENCE MEMBER: We can't
5 hear.

6 MR. PETERS: Lee Peters, counsel for the
7 association. I'm interpreting the motion that Mr. Hayhoe
8 made to be a motion to table until other things are
9 discussed in the meeting as he mentioned and so that does
10 have priority. We have to take up that motion first
11 before we got back to the main motion.

12 MR. MILES: Lee Miles, nonmember. I'm going
13 to recommend that everybody who speaks put their mouth as
14 close to this microphone as they can. That's going to
15 eliminate a lot of confusion. And everybody can hear me
16 okay. Right? And I'm not screaming. Okay. That's just
17 a recommendation. Thank you very much.

18 MR. JACQUEZ: Any further discussion?

19 Just to clarify. The motion that's pending
20 that you're voting on, a yes vote would be to defer the
21 consideration of the motion to approve the November 2013
22 minutes until later on the agenda until after public input
23 or other discussion. A vote of no is to take up the
24 approval of the November '13 minutes right now.

25 Call for the vote. "Yes" vote.

1 (Audience discussion off the stenographic
2 record.)

3 MS. HORTON: Call for your "no" vote.

4 MR. JACQUEZ: Okay. Against? Raise your
5 hand.

6 (Audience discussion off the stenographic
7 record.)

8 MR. JACQUEZ: On the next vote, we're having
9 a little bit of trouble counting and stuff so on the yeas
10 and the nays, would you please stand so we can get a true
11 count. Okay?

12 (Audience discussion off the stenographic
13 record.)

14 MR. JACQUEZ: Vote results?

15 MS. HORTON: 74; 38.

16 MR. JACQUEZ: 74; 38. The yeas have it.

17 Okay. We will -- we'll defer that down here
18 to public input and then act on that. Okay?

19 We'll now move on to new business. Okay.

20 Approval of Open Meetings Act resolution 2014-03.

21 Need a motion.

22 UNIDENTIFIED AUDIENCE MEMBER: Aren't you
23 doing it ballots?

24 MS. LEUENBERGER: Anna Leuenberger, member,
25 and I move that we approve the open meeting -- Open

1 Meetings Act resolution.

2 MR. JACQUEZ: Okay. We have a motion to
3 approve. And a second?

4 MR. ANDERSON: Curt Anderson, member.
5 Second.

6 MR. JACQUEZ: We have a second. Discuss it.

7 UNIDENTIFIED AUDIENCE MEMBER: Discussion.

8 MR. JACQUEZ: You've got something, sir?

9 Come on up.

10 MR. ELLINS: Lynn Ellins, member.

11 UNIDENTIFIED AUDIENCE MEMBER: Louder.

12 MR. ELLINS: Mr. Chairman, Lynn Ellins,
13 member.

14 UNIDENTIFIED AUDIENCE MEMBER: Hold it right
15 to your mouth, Lynn.

16 MR. JACQUEZ: We still can't hear you, Mr.
17 Ellins.

18 MR. ELLINS: Lynn Ellins, member. I'm going
19 to get everybody's germs.

20 How's that? Better?

21 AUDIENCE: Yes.

22 MR. ELLINS: All right. Now I'm going to be
23 sick in the morning, but it's okay.

24 I've got a couple of questions about the
25 manner in which notice is provided for. Throughout the

1 various paragraphs it says that the agenda for any meeting
2 will be posted on the Website, but the notice of the
3 meeting itself will be posted on the bulletin board in the
4 office. I'm not going to travel down to look at the
5 bulletin board, but I will open my computer to look at any
6 notice of meeting on the computer. So I would suggest
7 that in paragraph 2, before it says the agenda will be
8 available from the -- from the staff or on the Website,
9 that it read notice of the meeting and the agenda will be
10 available from the staff and on the Website at least 72
11 hours in advance of the meeting.

12 I have the same amendment proposed for
13 paragraph 3 which again would read notice of the meeting
14 and the agenda shall be available to the public at least
15 72 hours before the meeting and will be posted on the
16 association's Website.

17 I have the same amendment for paragraph 6
18 which says that the time, date, place and information of
19 mem- -- members may obtain a copy of the agenda shall be
20 posted in the following locations. And it reads Dona Ana
21 MDWCA office bulletin board. And I would add to that "and
22 on the association's Website." And also with respect to
23 paragraph 7, the same language that in addition to the
24 agenda being posted for special and emergency meetings on
25 the Website that the meeting notice of the meetings be

1 posted on the Website.

2 And I ask for a motion to approve this
3 amendment.

4 MR. HAYHOE: My name is Jim Hayhoe and I
5 second that motion.

6 MR. JACQUEZ: Okay. We have a motion to the
7 amendment which is fine, it's very doable.

8 I'm sorry. We agree. Very doable. You're
9 asking us to do something that's -- yeah, that you need to
10 do. We'll do it. Okay? So we have a motion and a
11 second, okay, to approve the Open Meetings Act resolution
12 with amendment.

13 Call for a vote.

14 All in favor would you please stand.

15 (Audience discussion off the stenographic
16 record.)

17 MR. JACQUEZ: We have a count for the yeas.
18 Ladies and gentlemen, please, when you stand up, don't
19 walk around, it's hard for these people to stay up with
20 you.

21 Okay. The nays. A show of hands for the
22 nays.

23 None.

24 Okay. I remind everybody. You vote because
25 you are a member. Okay? A husband and wife doesn't

1 entitle -- entitle you to two votes. It's been identified
2 already with that so, please, help us with the count. We
3 have nothing close right now. So I'd hate to go back and
4 do the recount on this one. If you want to we will, but I
5 just remind you about the rules. Okay? Please.

6 Okay. We'll move on to -- so we have an
7 approval of the Open Meetings Act with the amendment.
8 Okay?

9 We'll move on to approval of Article V,
10 Section 1.

11 Jen, you want to read this?

12 MS. HORTON: Sure.

13 MR. JACQUEZ: Let me back off a little bit.
14 Let's get a motion so we can read it and explain it and
15 discuss this then. Okay?

16 We need a motion to accept proposed
17 amendment number 1, Article V.

18 MR. ANDERSON: Curt Anderson, member. I
19 pro- -- I move approval of the proposed bylaw amendment
20 number 1 as -- as displayed.

21 UNIDENTIFIED AUDIENCE MEMBER: Can't read
22 it.

23 MR. JACQUEZ: Okay. We will take care of
24 this in a minute. Okay?

25 We have a motion to accept Article V,

1 Section 1.

2 MS. HORTON: What is your name?

3 MR. HOKKANEN: January Hokkanen. I'll
4 second that for discussion.

5 MR. JACQUEZ: That's where we're headed.
6 Okay. We have a second. Okay. We're open for
7 discussion. Let us read on what the motion is -- or what
8 the -- what we're voting on.

9 MS. HORTON: Okay. So the way it is
10 currently in our bylaws now it states: Section 1, annual
11 membership meeting. The annual meeting of the members of
12 this association shall be held on the last Wednesday of
13 January of each year.

14 The recommended amendment reads: The annual
15 meeting of the members of this association shall be held
16 between January 10th and March 10th of each year on a date
17 set by the board of directors.

18 So some background behind this is one of the
19 issues we've run into is this last election. It dictated
20 when we could open voting, when we closed voting, which
21 made it for a very tight time frame to get everything done
22 and it didn't allow everybody to get membership documents
23 done on time to be voting members. But because this was
24 in our bylaws that we had to have our membership meeting
25 on the last Wednesday of January, we just couldn't scoot

1 back any to allow for additional time. And that's where
2 this recommendation came from and why this is here. It's
3 to allow some flexibility so as things come up, if we need
4 to allot for additional time, the ability is there.

5 MR. PHILO: Andy Philo, member. I guess I
6 have a little bit of a question. To give notice to all of
7 the members, as I understand the bylaws, requires a 10-day
8 notice. Is that not correct?

9 MR. JACQUEZ: Yes.

10 MR. PHILO: So we can get a notice 10 days
11 prior to you wanting an annual meeting.

12 The next part of that question is that how
13 many days do we have to give notice to the board if we
14 want something on the agenda?

15 MR. JACQUEZ: I believe it's the same, isn't
16 it? We have a 10-day --

17 MR. PHILO: So you're telling me, then, the
18 same amount of time as I get the notice --

19 MR. JACQUEZ: Well --

20 MR. PHILO: -- I've got to let you know
21 something I want on the agenda. I think that that is
22 totally wrong.

23 MR. JACQUEZ: I think -- well, no, no, no.
24 I think the notice -- excuse me. I think the notice goes
25 to the membership. Okay? You're asking me if you want to

1 call a meeting?

2 MR. PHILO: No. Something on the agenda,
3 we're required to give you 10 days' notice; however, we
4 only get 10 days' notice that there's even going to be a
5 meeting.

6 MR. JACQUEZ: Yes.

7 MS. HORTON: The way it works is we have to
8 have the packages to the mailing company three days before
9 we want them in the mail. So if we want a 10-day notice,
10 we actually have to have our stuff in to Go Direct by 13
11 days before the meeting. So you would have to have any
12 questions or things you wanted addressed on the agenda to
13 us before 13 days.

14 MR. PHILO: I don't know if there's a
15 meeting called until I get it 10 days beforehand.

16 MS. HORTON: It would be in one of our
17 public meetings that the board of directors has. That's
18 when that meeting date gets set. So it would be on the
19 agenda for a regular board meeting to set that date. And
20 so you -- it would be on that regular agenda way before
21 the 10 days or way before the 13.

22 So -- so what I'm saying -- let's say the
23 date was March 10th. Okay? During the February board
24 meetings, the board would have to set that date and so
25 that date is determined well before the 10 days. Just the

1 package has to be mailed out 10 days before, not when the
2 date is decided.

3 MR. PHILO: Something doesn't sound quite
4 right there. There could be a real problem.

5 MR. CROWLEY: My name is Bob Crowley and I'm
6 a member. I tried to put something on the agenda 15 days
7 before today's meeting and I was rejected. Now, there's
8 no policy written anywhere that I'm aware of, is what
9 Jennifer just said, that if you submit it 13 days in
10 advance, you can get it on the agenda, blah, blah, blah.
11 Andy Philo is absolutely right. If we get a meeting
12 notice 10 days in advance and we have to add something on
13 the agenda 13 days in advance, we'll never get anything on
14 the agenda.

15 The second thing is is just because the
16 board has a meeting in February trying to call a meeting
17 for March doesn't mean that they can't call a special
18 meeting at the end of March and change the date with 10
19 days' notice. So the point here I think is is that if you
20 want to know when your annual meeting is you'd better have
21 it on the bylaws, set date. It's been that way for 50
22 years. It seems to work. I don't know why we have to
23 have this fluid date so that we're all confused about when
24 the annual meeting is.

25 Thank you.

1 MR. HAYHOE: My name is Jim Hayhoe and I'd
2 like to make two other points here, too. We've forgotten
3 or haven't yet mentioned that there is a whole group of
4 members called Snow Birds that they tend to leave starting
5 in the month of March. And what we're doing by
6 potentially having this meeting as late as March and
7 potentially even defer it beyond that by a
8 specially-called meeting is that we disenfranchise a good
9 percentage of our membership from having the opportunity
10 to come to the annual meeting.

11 Secondly, I would echo the fact that this
12 has been the last Wednesday of January since 1976. I see
13 absolutely no reason to make a change.

14 MR. BAILEY: My name's Steve Bailey and I'm
15 a member. And I would like to kind of agree with that.
16 The idea here is to -- not to disenfranchise our members
17 but to make it convenient. And one of the conveniences
18 that we need is notice and time to make -- bring anything
19 on the agenda. If you say that we have to have it 13 days
20 before the meeting and we don't know it's a meeting until
21 10 days, that's ridiculous. We need to keep -- either
22 keep the date, which was the last Wednesday, or give a
23 very small window to allow for certain changes. I mean
24 that could be. But as it stands now, I say leave the
25 time. The only reason they gave for doing this is because

1 they couldn't get all the new members in. Well, how many
2 new members are we going to get? Is this going to be
3 every year we're going to get 500 or 600 more people? I
4 don't think so. I think what we need to do really here
5 and all this -- and it's been very evident tonight -- the
6 people, the members, the owners of this group, we don't
7 know how to get anything on the agenda, we don't know how
8 to get anything in the meeting, we don't know how to speak
9 about things in the meeting. This cannot go on.

10 MR. PALMER: Harry Palmer, I'm a member.
11 I've been a member of this association since 1980. I've
12 attended about 95 percent of the meetings that have been
13 held. This amendment or this change actually is a good
14 idea because it allows some more flexibility than what
15 we've had in the past. There have been times we've had
16 storms and we've had few people show up. There have been
17 times that other things such as the schools are having
18 events and people would go to those rather than come here
19 to the meetings.

20 Now, I would like to amend this proposal by
21 requiring the board to publicize or to establish the date
22 and publicize it 30 days before the proposed meeting.
23 That's a mov- -- I move that. I'll get that motion right.
24 I'm getting tired.

25 MR. JACQUEZ: This is about the annual --

1 MR. PALMER: On the annual meeting so that
2 the board will publicize it at a minimum of 30 days before
3 the meeting is to be held.

4 I need a second.

5 MR. JACQUEZ: I need a second.

6 MR. HEARD: I'm Chuck Heard and I second
7 that. And I am a member.

8 MR. JACQUEZ: We have a second.

9 MR. PETERS: He just seconded it.

10 MR. JACQUEZ: Any other discussion?

11 MR. CROWLEY: Point of order. Point of
12 order. I'm Bob Crowley. I'd like a legal opinion as to
13 whether you can amend a bylaw amendment at the meeting.
14 And the reason for that being is if there's about 30- --
15 3,500 other people who have no clue that what was supposed
16 to be voted on has just now changed, could now change in
17 the last couple of minutes. And I'd like the legal
18 opinion in writing.

19 MR. JACQUEZ: You want the legal opinion or
20 you want it in writing?

21 MR. CROWLEY: Both.

22 MR. PETERS: Lee Peters, counsel for the
23 association. I'll give you my opinion.

24 Yes, you can amend a bylaw that's on the
25 agenda at the meeting and that's why people need to come

1 to meetings because things may change before they get
2 voted on. And so certainly -- it's certainly proper to
3 have amendments to something that's on the agenda like a
4 bylaw amendment.

5 MR. JACQUEZ: Yes, sir.

6 MR. ELLINS: Lynn Ellins, I'm a member. We
7 don't -- I agree with the proposal the gentleman made, but
8 we really don't have any language to vote on so I would
9 suggest that after it's the word directors, it says:
10 Provided that at least 30 days' notice of the meeting is
11 given to the membership. Then we know what we're talking
12 about and we have some language to deal with.

13 MR. JACQUEZ: Okay. We got off track a
14 little bit. We have a motion and a second on the
15 amendment to change it to 90 days.

16 MS. HORTON: 30.

17 MR. JACQUEZ: 30 days. I'm sorry.

18 MR. ELLINS: Just so it says it provided at
19 least 30 days' notice of the meeting is given to the
20 membership. Then you've got something to vote on.

21 MS. HORTON: He's going to type it in.

22 MS. LEUENBERGER: Anna Leuenberger and I am
23 a member. And this amendment as amended still doesn't
24 give a time frame. And so that could be into March, could
25 be in April. It's not exact enough. Well, 30 -- 30 days'

1 notice between January 10th and January -- March -- 10th
2 of March is that staying or is it just 30 days whenever?

3 MR. JACQUEZ: Okay. We have a motion on the
4 floor and a second. We'll read the amendment.

5 Go ahead.

6 MS. HORTON: Okay. As typed with the
7 amendment: The annual meeting of the members of this
8 association shall be held between January 10 and March 10
9 of each year on a date set by the board of directors
10 provided that at least 30-day notice of the meeting be
11 given to the membership. Period.

12 UNIDENTIFIED AUDIENCE MEMBER: Given in what
13 way?

14 (Audience discussion off the stenographic
15 record.)

16 MR. STRAMIELO: Tom Stramielo, member. I'd
17 like to call a question.

18 MR. JACQUEZ: Okay. We need to deal with
19 the amendment first.

20 MR. PETERS: There's been a suggestion to
21 clarify how notice will be given. Our suggestion from the
22 board is to give notice in accordance with the Open
23 Meetings Act.

24 MS. HORTON: Per Kathy Jackson. Kathy
25 Jackson --

1 MR. PETERS: Kathy Johnson makes that
2 recommendation.

3 MS. HORTON: Jackson.

4 MR. PETERS: Kathy --

5 MS. HORTON: Jackson.

6 MR. PETERS: -- Jackson. Sorry.

7 So it would be given in accordance with the
8 Open Meetings Act.

9 MS. HORTON: In accordance with the Open
10 Meetings Act.

11 UNIDENTIFIED AUDIENCE MEMBER: Need
12 clarification. Is this an annual meeting or a special
13 meeting.

14 MR. JACQUEZ: You need to come up, ma'am.

15 MR. PETERS: This deal with a special -- I'm
16 sorry. The annual meeting only.

17 MR. PHILO: Andy Philo, member. I guess I'd
18 like to just alert everyone. What's happening here right
19 now is that at any time at a board meeting a bylaw can be
20 changed whether you folks are here -- and this represents
21 every member here -- they can do it at their own choice
22 and I don't think that's right.

23 MR. JACQUEZ: Our procedure is set up as the
24 quorum can make the changes.

25 Go ahead.

1 MR. HAYHOE: My name is Jim Hayhoe again and
2 I just remembered what my issue was with this. It depends
3 on how you're going to make the notice because on the
4 Website, the board minutes -- minutes of the board
5 meetings, regular board meetings typically lag by about 45
6 to 60 days. So if your decision is that a board meeting
7 to be able to set a date for the annual meeting, then we
8 need to make sure we have a real clear way that this is
9 being distributed. And I don't think it's just sufficient
10 to be able to make that notice by -- at the board meeting
11 because you're going to be 45 days before you get that
12 out.

13 MS. HORTON: And we acknowledge that we've
14 been slow getting it up and we're in the process of
15 updating our Website and redoing the whole thing so that
16 we have better control over it so that we can update our
17 Website more timely rather than going to a third party to
18 update. So at this state it will be given in accordance
19 of the Open Meetings Act so it will be posted on the home
20 page of the Website and also on the bulletin board.

21 MR. JACQUEZ: Okay. A question has been
22 called. We'll vote on the amendment.

23 We have a question.

24 UNIDENTIFIED AUDIENCE MEMBER: I have a
25 suggestion for the board on this. The mess that you guys

1 are in and that we're in is exactly because of this type
2 of thing. And I think you're presenting an amendment, but
3 it's just not thought out and it's a mess and now you're
4 making changes to it and -- and this is the kind of thing
5 that's going to end us all in court because of
6 disagreements on what was said and the language in it and
7 when it was passed. So I would make a suggestion to the
8 board to take this amendment, withdraw it from the -- from
9 the assembly and go back and write it the way it should be
10 with some very specific thought and then bring it back to
11 us so we don't end up with another mess, another fight
12 next year over what's in the bylaws and what isn't.

13 MR. ELLINS: Lynn Ellins, member again.
14 Still.

15 Lee, what is the notice requirement in the
16 Open Meetings Act? How many days is it?

17 MR. PETERS: For an annual meeting --

18 AUDIENCE: We can't hear.

19 MR. PETERS: Okay. Sorry. If you add this
20 language in accordance with the Open Meetings Act, then it
21 incorporates the notice that's required under the
22 resolution that was just passed under the Open Meetings
23 Act so exactly how many days, I'd have to sit down and
24 figure that out.

25 MR. ELLINS: Well, if it's -- if the Open

1 Meetings Act is fewer than 10 days -- excuse me -- if it's
2 10 days, but fewer than 30, I think you have the option to
3 exceed the requirements of the Open Meetings Act because
4 the Open Meetings Act sets minimums, not maximums.

5 MR. PETERS: Well, that's what this would
6 do. Because you're saying that you would have to have at
7 least 30 days' notice so you're overriding whatever
8 minimum the Open Meetings Act would require unless the
9 Open Meetings Act required more than 30 days. So you're
10 giving at least 30 days. The Open Meetings Act is the
11 mechanism by which you give notice and that notice is on
12 the Website and --

13 MR. ELLINS: Well, my problem is that if the
14 Open Meetings Act says 10 days, that -- that viciates the
15 30-day proposal because the statute would probably
16 overrule whatever we do here today.

17 MR. PETERS: No, I would disagree, Lynn.
18 The statute only creates minimums. If we choose to give
19 more notice than the open meetings act, that would
20 override the Open Meetings Act. We couldn't give less
21 than the Open Meetings Act.

22 MR. ELLINS: I agree with that. But then I
23 guess my question is why do we even have to mention the
24 Open Meetings Act. If we want it in 30 days, we do 30
25 days.

1 MR. PETERS: Somebody asked why -- what
2 means we would convey that to the membership. That's why
3 we're incorporating the Open Meetings Act and the
4 resolution that we just passed that provides how we give
5 notice out of that to the --

6 MR. ELLINS: But the -- but the prior
7 provision of the bylaw says you'll give notice in mai- --
8 by mail so that's already covered. That's in the handout
9 that we have. It already says the annual meeting notice
10 will be given in various ways including mailing to the
11 membership. So you really don't need that language
12 because I think it confuses the issue. That's all.

13 MR. JACQUEZ: That's Section 8, Lee.
14 Section 8.

15 Go ahead.

16 MS. DICKSON: I'm Ginger Dickson. I'm a
17 member. And I make a motion to table action on the
18 amendment change.

19 MR. JACQUEZ: Miss? Ma'am? Did you make a
20 motion on the amendment or the motion?

21 UNIDENTIFIED AUDIENCE MEMBER: Table the
22 whole thing.

23 MS. DICKSON: I move that action on the
24 proposed bylaw change be tabled.

25 MR. PETERS: There's been a motion to table

1 any action on this amendment.

2 MR. HOKKANEN: Jack Hokkanen, I'd like to
3 second that.

4 MR. PETERS: There's been a second. So
5 motion to table is a priority motion. We have to take
6 that up first. A vote of "yes" on the motion to table
7 effectively kills any action on this bylaw amendment at
8 this meeting. A vote of "no" would mean we would continue
9 to debate it and take a vote on it.

10 MR. JACQUEZ: Call for the vote. Yes?
11 Stand.

12 (Audience discussion off the stenographic
13 record.)

14 MS. HORTON: Call for the nos.

15 MR. JACQUEZ: Okay. The nos stand, please.

16 (Audience discussion off the stenographic
17 record.)

18 MR. JACQUEZ: The vote is 69; 32.

19 MS. HORTON: 69 yes.

20 MR. JACQUEZ: 69 yes; 32 nay.

21 Matter's -- okay. The matter's tabled.

22 Okay. We'll move on to approval of

23 Article 5, Section 4. Need a motion.

24 MR. ANDERSON: Mr. Chair, I'm Curt Anderson,
25 member. I move approval of proposed bylaw amendment

1 number 2 as displayed and as handed out.

2 MR. JACQUEZ: Okay. We have a motion to
3 approve Article 5, Section 4. Have a second?

4 MR. HOKKANEN: I'll second that for
5 discussion. And if I might start the discussion.

6 MR. JACQUEZ: Hold on. We have a second.
7 It opens it up to discussion.

8 Go ahead, sir. Tell us who you are.

9 MR. HOKKANEN: With the additional name --

10 MR. JACQUEZ: Excuse me. I'm sorry.

11 MR. HOKKANEN: Jack Hokkanen.

12 With the addition of Picacho Hills and
13 Fort Selden where we've added, what, 1,300, 1,400
14 additional customers in that vicinity to now drop the
15 quorum that was one percent and bring it down to a half
16 percent, I think we're going the wrong way. I -- I would
17 suggest that we keep -- that we vote no on this
18 recommended amendment and keep it at the one percent.

19 MR. JACQUEZ: Okay. So everybody
20 understands the amendment reads one percent of the total
21 membership of the association shall constitute a quorum at
22 any meeting of the association for the transaction of
23 business. Also one percent of the total membership
24 association shall constitute a quorum for any special
25 meeting of the members of the association with 48 hours'

1 notice. Recommendation changes one-half of one percent
2 for the total membership of the association shall
3 constitute a quorum at any regular or special meeting.

4 May I please speak to the motion also or to
5 to the recommendation. You know, you guys, you accuse us
6 of not really knowing some of the stuff or not -- you
7 know, we lived through this and it was very, very hard to
8 get a quorum. Okay? In fact we went through a meeting
9 where we couldn't even conduct business because of that
10 and that was our concern. Obviously, if everybody now
11 shows the enthusiasm that you do, we don't have to worry
12 about this one. I totally agree with you. But there was
13 a need. Okay? And the board does discuss these changes.
14 Okay? And we do a lot of thought on that. You have to --
15 you have to understand that. That's why we do it. But
16 the membership is the membership and we work for the
17 membership. Okay? So that's why the recommendation came
18 from the board. For no other reason. Okay?

19 Okay. It's yours.

20 MS. TATUM: Very good. Sandy Tatum from
21 Radium Springs. I am a member.

22 I ask us all to remember, as we consider the
23 reduction of the quorum, that we are in a time of a pretty
24 messy working out of a complex situation. We have
25 increased membership beyond what most of us have had to

1 deal with in our other water systems. We have districts
2 now. We have a representative from the districts on the
3 board. This makes for a complicated messy working out and
4 it takes the creativity and the solid representation that
5 comes from devising good mechanisms for representing, for
6 voting which also takes communication. Look what
7 communication got here tonight. We all responded. This
8 is what should be happening when we have meetings so that
9 our representatives so acting as a total board acts in
10 conjunction with the business requirements, crises,
11 concerns, needs throughout our membership. So, therefore,
12 I say, even though I was here November 7th, I came to the
13 meeting, I was counted, but we barely made a quorum. We
14 did make it, but it -- it was astounding to look around
15 and realize that in this mutual domestic association where
16 everybody wants representation, we weren't -- we're not
17 there yet. The -- some people don't realize the parts of
18 the business that their input is very important on and how
19 important it is that we make use of the fact that we have
20 districts and we have representatives now we can go to to
21 try and make sure, as a board, they are informed and that
22 we -- that the information comes back to us and that our
23 bylaws do protect us and are legal.

24 So to cut -- to avoid problems to cut
25 representation to a half percent, I don't think anybody

1 would be happy to know that 20, 25 people could make the
2 kinds of decisions that we're trying painfully to work out
3 here. And these aren't even issues yet of -- that deal
4 with direct -- don't seem to deal directly with the water
5 issues.

6 So I ask you to remember that. That it's a
7 mutual domestic and we voted to have districts and
8 representation. Let's hang in there -- even though it's
9 difficult -- insist that we work out what proper
10 meaningful representation in a whole mutual domestic water
11 association might look like. Thank you.

12 MR. BAILEY: I'll try to keep this one
13 brief. What --

14 UNIDENTIFIED AUDIENCE MEMBER: Name?

15 MR. BAILEY: My name is Steve Bailey and I'm
16 a member.

17 One of the things that, as I said before, is
18 making it easy for members to attend the meetings and this
19 includes good notice, finding out what's going on. I
20 jumped through so many hoops trying to become a member, I
21 called three people up here at the offices. I talked to
22 three different people. I got three different answers and
23 eventually was turned down. I mean they sent me stuff.
24 E-mails to fill this, mark -- mark this. Those are little
25 things that make it difficult. If the board would

1 concentrate, perhaps, on making it easier to come out, to
2 show up, then you're going to get good representation.
3 I'm against decreasing the quorum. That's going in the
4 wrong direction. We want to be more inclusive and get
5 more input. One thing that I could suggest and I've run
6 this -- you know, from our association at the beginning
7 was very difficult to get a quorum. We did have a rule in
8 place where if you don't have the quorum then you have
9 the -- a second meeting at a reduced number but within 30
10 days, you know, so that you can have the meeting. That
11 would be the only concession I could think of, but I do
12 not agree with this. Thank you.

13 MS. TOM-NELSON: Cheryl Tom-Nelson. I'm a
14 member.

15 I'm curious. We're saying one percent and
16 the quorum. But with the prior membership, before you
17 added Fort Selden and Picacho, what the quorum was, 40?

18 UNIDENTIFIED AUDIENCE MEMBER: 31 at the
19 November meeting.

20 MR. JACQUEZ: It was -- it was still based
21 on one percent. Right, Jen? Whatever the numbers were,
22 one percent of the membership.

23 MS. NELSON: So how many members are --
24 would we need by adding the roughly, what, 1,300 members
25 that have been added? So how many more? How many would a

1 quorum be? I just want to see if the one percent is
2 reasonable.

3 MR. JACQUEZ: Total if --

4 MS. HORTON: We went -- Jennifer Horton. We
5 went from meeting quorum of 31 prior -- in the last
6 January meeting, January of last year, to tonight of
7 needing 41. So it increased by 10.

8 MR. JACQUEZ: One percent. One percent.

9 In no way are we intending to cut
10 representation at all. We were just -- as I stated
11 before, our whole intent was just to make sure we had a --
12 a quorum and we could conduct business. Okay?

13 Yes, sir.

14 MR. FINO: In lieu of your just comment
15 there and the lady from Radium Springs, I think maybe we
16 should table this.

17 (Audience discussion off the stenographic
18 record.)

19 MR. JACQUEZ: To make that a motion? Sir,
20 did you make a motion?

21 UNIDENTIFIED AUDIENCE MEMBER: Yes, he made
22 a motion.

23 MR. JACQUEZ: Okay. He made a motion to
24 table. Action on this. Do we have a second?

25 UNIDENTIFIED AUDIENCE MEMBER: No.

1 MR. JACQUEZ: Do we have a second? Do we
2 have a second? Motion dies.

3 MR. ZOLTO: Bob Zolto, a member. I second.

4 MR. JACQUEZ: Let's get interpretation.

5 What was the motion? Clarification on the
6 motion.

7 UNIDENTIFIED AUDIENCE MEMBER: Table it.

8 MR. JACQUEZ: It was to table the motion.

9 Right?

10 UNIDENTIFIED AUDIENCE MEMBER: And we had a
11 second.

12 MR. JACQUEZ: And second.

13 You moved to table the motion. Right, sir?

14 Okay. It was to table it and we had a
15 second.

16 MR. PETERS: Okay. As before -- Lee Peters,
17 counsel for the association -- the vote is on motion to
18 table consideration of this bylaw amendment. A vote of
19 "yes" sets the matter aside. We don't take it up again.
20 A vote of not keeps the debate going and eventually a vote
21 on this bylaw amendment.

22 MR. JACQUEZ: Okay. We call for the vote
23 then. All in favor stand, please.

24 (Audience discussion off the stenographic
25 record.)

1 MS. HORTON: "No" votes.

2 MR. JACQUEZ: I need the "no" vote. Please
3 stand.

4 (Audience discussion off the stenographic
5 record.)

6 MR. JACQUEZ: Count.

7 MS. HORTON: 25; 72 "no."

8 MR. JACQUEZ: 25 --

9 MS. HORTON: "Yes."

10 MR. JACQUEZ: -- "yes."

11 MS. HORTON: 72 "no."

12 MR. JACQUEZ: 72 "no."

13 So the amendment dies.

14 We're back to the motion. Discussion.

15 MS. LEUENBERGER: Anna Leuenberger. I am a
16 member and I move that we vote on this amendment and I
17 recommend we vote it down.

18 MR. FELHAUER: Larry Felhauer, member. I
19 have a question about this. It's really a question I
20 think for Lee for a legal opinion. I'm concerned about
21 the recommended amendment as it's worded. First of all
22 I'm against it. I don't think we should vote to lower the
23 quorum. But the part about the 48-hour notice. What
24 happens to our meeting notice now because the way this is
25 worded you take away the meeting notice.

1 MR. PETERS: That extra language that's in
2 the bylaw right now is not consistent with the bylaw in
3 the article that requires notice for a special meeting.
4 So it was best to take it out because it was inconsistent
5 anyway.

6 MR. FELHAUER: So what's the notice for a
7 special meeting, then, under the bylaws?

8 MR. PETERS: Well, it's -- under the Open
9 Meeting Act it's 72 hours for a special meeting. But this
10 is a meeting of the membership. I'm thinking of meetings
11 of the board. It's more than 48 hours, I can tell you
12 that, so it's inconsistent so that's why we chose to take
13 it out.

14 MR. FELHAUER: Well, I'm still wondering
15 what the -- what the notification requirement is.

16 MR. PETERS: 10 days.

17 MR. FELHAUER: 10 days for any meeting,
18 special or otherwise.

19 MR. PETERS: The agenda has to be posted
20 within 72 hours.

21 MR. FELHAUER: Okay.

22 MS. MILLER: Judith Miller. I'm a member
23 and I second Anna Leuenberger's motion.

24 MR. JACQUEZ: Okay. Call for a vote then.

25 Okay. Taking a vote. The motion is to

1 approve the Article 5, Section 4, okay, and we have a
2 second. All the "yeas" stand up for the motion.

3 UNIDENTIFIED AUDIENCE MEMBER: Clarification.

4 MS. HORTON: You need to clarify what their
5 voting -- what the "yea" stands for.

6 UNIDENTIFIED AUDIENCE MEMBER: We could not
7 understand what you were saying.

8 MR. JACQUEZ: We are recommending an
9 amendment change. We are voting to approve or not
10 approve.

11 UNIDENTIFIED AUDIENCE MEMBER: "Yeas" would
12 be approving?

13 MS. HORTON: A "yes" is to approve.

14 UNIDENTIFIED AUDIENCE MEMBER: A "yes" is to
15 approve.

16 MS. HORTON: Get your "yes" votes. "Yes"
17 votes.

18 UNIDENTIFIED AUDIENCE MEMBER: Are -- are we
19 "yes" voting?

20 MS. HORTON: I thought so.

21 Are we "yes" voting?

22 MR. JACQUEZ: Yes, we're voting "yes."

23 MS. HORTON: Okay. "Yes" votes stand up.

24 AUDIENCE: For what?

25 UNIDENTIFIED AUDIENCE MEMBER: To approve

1 the amendments.

2 MS. HORTON: To approve the amendments.

3 MR. McKAY: To my knowledge -- oh, I'm
4 Franklin McKay and I am a member. And to my knowledge
5 there is not a true motion on the docket right now. As
6 far as I understand it, we have discussed whether we're
7 going to have a half a percent or whether we were going to
8 have one. I make a motion, being there is not a motion on
9 the table, that we accept the one motion in the place of
10 the half a motion and vote on that.

11 UNIDENTIFIED AUDIENCE MEMBER: What?

12 (Audience discussion off the stenographic
13 record.)

14 MR. McKAY: I'm talking about the half a
15 percent for memberships and I vote against -- I want to
16 have a motion that we accept one percent.

17 UNIDENTIFIED AUDIENCE MEMBER: No, you can't
18 do that.

19 (Audience discussion off the stenographic
20 record.)

21 MR. JACQUEZ: Okay. We're -- we're out of
22 order a little bit. We -- we do have a motion on the
23 table.

24 Go ahead, ma'am. Clarify.

25 MS. LEUENBERGER: Okay. My motion was just

1 to call -- my motion was to call for the vote. To call
2 for the vote. And of course it -- so you'd have to vote
3 whether you're going to stop the -- stop the discussion
4 and -- and do a vote and then, if that passed, then you
5 vote on the amendment.

6 (Audience discussion off the stenographic
7 record.)

8 MR. PETERS: Okay. Lee Peters, counsel.
9 Technically she's called a question which requires a
10 two-thirds vote to stop debate. You can do that by
11 acclamation or you can stand up, however people prefer.
12 If you call -- if that call to question is approved, then
13 we move to the vote on the merits of the motion which is
14 to approve the amendment.

15 MR. JACQUEZ: So a "yes" would approve the
16 amendment.

17 AUDIENCE: No.

18 (Audience discussion off the record.)

19 MR. JACQUEZ: I'm confused with it now.

20 MR. PETERS: Okay. To call a question
21 requires a two-thirds vote to close debate and move to the
22 issue of voting on this amendment. So does the group want
23 to do that by acclamation?

24 AUDIENCE: Yes.

25 MR. PETERS: All in favor of closing debate

1 and calling the question say "aye."

2 AUDIENCE: Aye.

3 MR. PETERS: All opposed.

4 I think that means that everybody wants to
5 vote.

6 MR. JACQUEZ: We're back to the question.

7 We're taking the "yeses," the "ayes." "Aye"
8 is for the change. All the "ayes" stand up.

9 (Audience discussion off the stenographic
10 record.)

11 MS. HORTON: Okay.

12 MR. JACQUEZ: Okay. All the "nays."

13 (Audience discussion off the stenographic
14 record.)

15 MR. JACQUEZ: The count. 89 to 4.

16 Okay. We're done with this now. We're
17 moving on now to public issues.

18 UNIDENTIFIED AUDIENCE MEMBER: What was the
19 count?

20 (Audience discussion off the stenographic
21 record.)

22 MR. JACQUEZ: I gave you the count.

23 I'm sorry, Jen. Go ahead.

24 MS. HORTON: It's 89 to 4.

25 MR. JACQUEZ: 89 --

1 MS. HORTON: "No."

2 MR. JACQUEZ: -- "nos."

3 MS. HORTON: It failed.

4 MR. JACQUEZ: It failed. 4 "yeses." Right?

5 Okay. We're down to public input. I remind
6 you the rules that were set. Individually, if you want to
7 address one of the issues and stuff, you've got two
8 minutes. If you represent a group, okay, you gain a
9 little bit. Just give us the name of the people that you
10 represent and that gives you 10 minutes. I remind you
11 it's 10 until 9:00. We have until 9:30.

12 MR. CROWLEY: My name's Bob Crowley and I'm
13 a member. As you remember I didn't get quite the --

14 MR. JACQUEZ: Attention, please.

15 MR. CROWLEY: And I do represent a number of
16 people, Jack Hokkanen, Jim Hayhoe, Andy Philo, a whole
17 bunch of people here so I'm going to ask them to give me
18 their time. All I need is about four or five minutes.

19 I'm going to read into the record what I
20 started to read into the record earlier which should be
21 evident when I'm done as to why I'm reading this into the
22 record because this has been the biggest rodeo I've ever
23 been to. I don't know what we voted on, I don't know what
24 we didn't vote on, I don't what language there was and so
25 I have some real issues about the November 7th meeting and

1 I have some real issues about the January election that
2 took place. Okay.

3 I represent a group of members that believes
4 that the meeting cannot proceed due to several
5 irregularities that have occurred since October 2013.
6 This meeting cannot proceed until we know what the correct
7 bylaws of the water company are that will govern this
8 meeting and who the valid directors are to sit at this
9 meeting.

10 First. The bylaws that were amended at the
11 November 7th special members meeting are invalid for three
12 reasons. One, we believe that there was an Open Meeting
13 Act violation since there was no vote to approve the
14 minutes of the January 2013 meeting as required by law.
15 This fact was pointed out to the board during the meeting
16 and the meeting continued anyway.

17 Two. The water company has been unable to
18 produce proof of a quorum at this November 7th meeting.
19 You can see why they could have trouble finding a proof of
20 quorum. I requested the proof of quorum under the
21 inspection of Public Records Act and they were incapable
22 of producing who was at the meeting.

23 Reason number three, most importantly. The
24 November 7th meeting notice mailed out October 25th, 2013,
25 to 3,131 members contained proposed bylaws language to be

1 voted on at the November 7th meeting. There's an
2 Exhibit C that's in their possession. The proposed bylaws
3 language distributed and actually voted on at the meeting
4 was materially different than what was previously mailed
5 out to the entire membership. The proposed minutes of the
6 meeting reflect no modification to the original language
7 nor is there any evidence of any changes posted 72 hours
8 prior to the meeting as required by law. It's
9 Exhibits 1-D and Exhibits 1-A. Any of these three reasons
10 will invalidate the bylaws amendments voted on at the
11 November 7th special members meeting. Second, the
12 election that took place in January 2014 to elect two
13 board members violated the bylaws. If the November 7th
14 bylaw amendments above are invalid, then the two board
15 seats should have been elected by an at-large vote of the
16 membership without regard to districts. In addition, even
17 if the bylaws amendments made it to the -- at the
18 November 7th meeting are somehow valid, those amendments
19 only provide for district representation and not district
20 voting. If you read the bylaws, that's what it says. All
21 water company members should have had the right to vote in
22 that election, not just the districts represented. The
23 effect of this is that approximately 2,500 members of the
24 water company were not permitted to vote for the two
25 directors. Since we don't know who the validly elected

1 directors of the water company are, this meeting cannot
2 proceed.

3 Third, on April 2nd, 2014, we received,
4 after making a formal request to the company, what was
5 represented to be the current bylaws. That's Exhibit 2-A.

6 On April 22nd, 2014, we received, quote,
7 corrected, unquote, bylaws with language different from
8 the first set. Exhibit 2-B.

9 On April 25th, 2015 [sic], we received a
10 copy of what recorded in the clerk's office on January 17,
11 2014, with language different than the corrected bylaws.
12 Exhibit 2-C.

13 We have no idea what the real bylaws of the
14 water company are and we cannot proceed until we can
15 ascertain what the proper bylaws are to guide this
16 meeting. Until legal issues surrounding the November 7th,
17 2013, meeting, the January 2014 elections and the
18 irregularities regarding the bylaws are resolved, we do
19 not feel the meeting can proceed. We hope that the board
20 takes these issues seriously and takes action to address
21 and resolve these issues with us. Thank you.

22 MR. JACQUEZ: Thank you, Mr. Crowley.

23 The chair recognizes Mr. Peters.

24 MR. PETERS: Yeah, I'm Lee Peters. I'm
25 counsel for the association. I've been counsel for some

1 seven or eight years. I represent all of you. You're the
2 association.

3 Mr. Crowley is represented by an attorney
4 who sent a letter last week to the board, a three-page
5 letter with a lot of documents attached. I did respond on
6 behalf of the association to Mr. Hubert with a three-page
7 letter with about six pages attached. I don't want to
8 bore you with the responses but none of the issues raised
9 by Mr. Hubert on behalf of this group have any merit.
10 There is no violation of the Open Meetings Act. There's
11 no violation of anything. Things were done properly.
12 Things were filed and recorded properly. Everything was
13 done properly. If you -- I think what we would offer to
14 do, the association, would be to post these on the
15 Website. You can read Mr. Hubert's letter, you can read
16 my letter and you can judge for yourself. But there's
17 nothing that's been raised that affects the validity of
18 this meeting or anything done at this meeting or anything
19 done at the November 7th meeting and I'd just like to
20 leave it at that unless you want to be bored with all the
21 gory details.

22 MR. CROWLEY: If I could just respond to
23 that for just -- for just a second.

24 (Audience discussion off the stenographic
25 record.)

1 MR. CROWLEY: If I could just respond to
2 that for just a second.

3 MR. JACQUEZ: Do you have the name, Miss?

4 MR. CROWLEY: Bob Crowley. I'm still a
5 member.

6 What we just heard was that there haven't
7 been any violations of any laws, any bylaws, any
8 procedures, et cetera, et cetera. And I would just ask
9 you all to think about what you just saw tonight in the
10 operation of this meeting and just ask yourself if it's
11 possible that there were no violations of any meetings,
12 bylaws, procedures, Robert's Rules of Order, et cetera, et
13 cetera.

14 MR. JACQUEZ: Any other input?

15 MR. FELHAUER: Larry Felhauer, member. I
16 have a question about getting items submitted for the
17 agenda. I know that there were some items that were
18 submitted for the agenda. To my knowledge they were done
19 in a timely fashion and yet there was never a response.
20 They were never posted on the agenda. What do we have to
21 do to get items on the agenda? Because I can't find
22 anything in the bylaws that -- that tells me what we'd
23 have to do.

24 MS. HORTON: Were you asking about
25 Mr. Crowley's request that was made to address the board

1 on the 22nd?

2 MR. FELHAUER: Yeah, he -- he sent some
3 proposed -- some proposed resolutions for the agenda and
4 they were never responded to and they were never posted on
5 the agenda.

6 MS. HORTON: They were responded to. Let me
7 clarify that because I personally responded.

8 He sent them on a Friday afternoon around
9 4:30 when we were closed, it was a holiday that was
10 recognized, and our agenda had been posted that Thursday
11 because we are were closed and we did not want to violate
12 the Open Meetings Act and so we wanted to post at least
13 72 hours before the meeting. So I offered to put him on
14 the May agenda. And you sent in a request to address the
15 board.

16 MR. CROWLEY: Different topic.

17 UNIDENTIFIED AUDIENCE MEMBER: Different
18 topic.

19 MS. HORTON: The letters? We sent back the
20 letter addressing the two -- the letters that you sent to
21 the board of directors. Have you not received them?

22 MR. CROWLEY: Yes.

23 MS. HORTON: You have received them.

24 MR. CROWLEY: I submitted by certified
25 letter -- on April 15th it was received by the water

1 company. April 15th a 10-day notice date was April 19th
2 for this meeting. I submitted by certified letter two
3 bylaws amendments that I wanted on the agenda and I got a
4 letter back from Jennifer, I don't know like the 26th or
5 something. I don't know. It was never responded to until
6 then. Of course by then the 10-day window had closed, et
7 cetera, and there was nothing put on the agenda for a
8 vote.

9 MR. JACQUEZ: Our package went to the
10 mailing company on April 11th. Just because our bylaws
11 require 10 days doesn't mean we wait until the last minute
12 to submit something. We want to get stuff out as soon as
13 possible once the agenda is finalized to the public so
14 that they have time to review it.

15 MR. CROWLEY: Publish that somewhere.

16 MR. ALLEN: Good evening. My name is
17 Michael Allen and I'm a member.

18 I would like to express very strongly a
19 feeling that I'm getting and the feeling is that we're at
20 fault. We're at fault if we didn't show up for the
21 meeting. Shame on us. We're at fault if we didn't get
22 something typed and sent in right. Shame on us. We're
23 members of this organiza- -- we didn't get our paperwork
24 in on time. Shame on us. I just don't like that feeling
25 I'm getting that the organization that's supposed to

1 represent me feels this way about me. And I don't feel
2 that way about them. I value them and treasure the fact
3 that they're willing to give service but every time
4 something comes up, the "I" wasn't dotted, the "T" wasn't
5 crossed. Shame on us, we didn't do it right. I don't
6 like the feeling. That makes me feel that someone is
7 trying to sneak something over and I don't like that
8 feeling.

9 MR. HOKKANEN: Jack Hokkanen, member by
10 marriage.

11 I'd like to just go back a little bit from
12 the time that I received notification that Dona Ana Mutual
13 Water was going to be taking over the Picacho Hills water
14 service and actually was quite excited about that based on
15 what we had to experience with the Picacho Hills
16 utilities. That started to change when you held the
17 election. I came in here like a month and a half before.
18 I came into the office, I filled out all the paperwork, I
19 gave them my credit card. I said, "Occasionally I'm gone.
20 I want to make sure you get your money, I get my water,
21 everything is going to be great. Did I fill out
22 everything?"

23 "Yup, yup. Everything is good. We can --
24 we can do the rest."

25 "So I'm a member?"

1 "Yup, yup, you're good."

2 So my wife goes in fully expecting to be
3 able to cast a ballot, of which she did, a provisional
4 ballot, and then I get a letter: Thank you for
5 participation. We regret -- we regretfully inform you
6 that your provisional ballot cast for the Dona Ana Mutual
7 Water election was not counted.

8 Now here I was told by the office, I had
9 come in early, I had completed everything. You blew me
10 out. You didn't allow us to vote. Then what really
11 topped it, you had at least a couple of months. I
12 happened to call one of the finest employees that I've
13 talked to in New Mexico, Linda Marina. I called Linda and
14 Linda said, "Mr. Hokkanen, I'm really" --

15 This is after the election. You know, she
16 said, "I know you've been getting the runaround on this.
17 Let me do this. I'll call you back within the hour." I
18 get this e-mail from Linda -- and you should all applaud
19 her: It was a pleasure talking to you on the phone today.
20 I apologize that you have gotten the runaround on this
21 account. That is why I wanted to take care of it
22 immediately. So, congratulations, you are now an
23 incredible member. Your file is complete. If you need
24 anything else, please call me -- with her phone number and
25 extension.

1 I said if I was going to start a business, I
2 want Linda Marina working for me. She did this in less
3 than an hour. Donna Anna Mutual Water had all my
4 paperwork for months and I didn't get to get my vote
5 counted. That's not right. And that's not right.

6 MR. HAYHOE: My name is Jim Hayhoe and I'm a
7 member and I'd like to address the same basic topic, but
8 I'd like to dig at it at a much broader level. I'd like
9 to record this into the record.

10 What I want to address is the 200-plus
11 Picacho Hill residents that are still not Donna Ana Water
12 members. Public meetings were hosted by the Picacho Hills
13 Property Owner's Association as early as June of last year
14 and again in September and October of last year to inform
15 Picacho Hills residents of the pending purchase of
16 Picacho Hills utility company by Dona Ana Water. At those
17 meetings Dona Ana Water informed the residents of the
18 requirement to become members. However, the requirements
19 were poorly presented and misleading and the actions taken
20 to date by Dona Ana Water have turned a simple task into a
21 complex problem.

22 Dona Ana Water became the water and sewer
23 provider to approximately 850 picacho Hills residents in
24 early December 2013. The election was held in
25 January 2014. Early voting started January 2rd. The

1 voting place was really the first time people like Jack
2 found that they were not members. At that time less than
3 300 residents were members and eligible to vote. 300 out
4 of the 850.

5 Now in April 2014, fully four months after
6 takeover and six to eight months since the first public
7 meetings, there are still only 2- -- 600 residents that
8 are members and eligible to vote tonight. We still have
9 200 to 250 stranded out there as not members.

10 Dona Ana Water must be given some credit for
11 recently adding new full and temporary work -- and I'll
12 support my notion -- the notion of having Linda
13 promoted -- and adding full and temporary staff to work
14 this problem. It comes down to we request that an
15 emergency plan be forthcoming from Dona Ana Water that
16 includes plan staff, inclusion -- inclusion of PHPOA, the
17 Picacho Hills Property Owner's Association, and a small
18 group of volunteers from Picacho Hills. A schedule of
19 completion and regular reviews by Dona Ana Water Board by
20 residents' name until 100 percent of the residents are
21 members. I -- we know a lot of the members. A lot of
22 them have special circumstances and require special
23 actions. This is not going to be resolved by a continuing
24 session of e-mails and letters. We need to take special
25 actions. Therefore I'm not sure I can do this, but I

1 would like to make a motion that an emergency plan be
2 forthcoming from Dona Ana Water that includes plan staff,
3 inclusion of PHPOA, a small group of volunteers, schedule
4 for completion and regular reviews by the Dona Ana Water
5 board by resident name until 100 percent of residents are
6 members.

7 MR. JACQUEZ: The motion is out of order.

8 You know, you guys, it's kind of hard to sit
9 here and take all this. It really is.

10 Well, go ahead with the comments. That's
11 okay. You know, we take the blame for it. I take the
12 blame for it, you know, for what's happened. It may be
13 miscommunication. You can blame it on anything. Maybe
14 you can blame it on the -- on the growth that we've
15 experienced so much. You know, we picked up two wat- --
16 three water associations or three new water groups, okay,
17 let me say it better, okay, with new membership and it's
18 brought some challenges to us. It really has. And maybe
19 we haven't met them. Nobody has come to talk to me, to
20 talk to the board to say, "Let's work together on this."
21 We've worked, too, separately. We met with you guys, I
22 think, three times over some issues. We brought the
23 redistricting up to you guys. We brought it up at
24 Fort Selden. We brought it up here locally to educate
25 people as much as we could for the right reasons. Okay?

1 If you think there's a wrong reason, that's okay. It's
2 the membership. I think you cannot judge us as not being
3 competent when we can sit here and -- and agree with you
4 and make those changes. We are not fighting you on this.
5 When we went to redistricting, we actually lost -- if you
6 want to say we lost our power. We lost two board members
7 to redistricting. We really did. And we picked up you
8 guys and we picked up Fort Seldon. Two brand-new. Fort
9 Seldon wanted to hang us; now you guys want to hang us.
10 What have we done wrong except try to make your situation
11 so much better. Your well went out in a couple of weeks
12 ago. Who stepped in and took care of it? Did anybody
13 tell you about that? The tank is in trouble. Who's going
14 to fix that? Did they tell you about that?

15 (Audience discussion off the stenographic
16 record.)

17 MR. JACQUEZ: And with -- I've got the
18 floor. Okay? And we'll step forward with those things.
19 If there's other issues, whether they be structural or
20 we're doing something wrong, come and talk at the board.
21 Nobody is denied from coming to the board. We have input.
22 Membership input. You don't have to be on the agenda.
23 Okay? We start a process. We have never had district
24 representation which made it better for us. Mr. Zeemont
25 and Mr. Melton stepped right in and they came up with the

1 idea, "Let's help deal with the problems individually,"
2 which worked out really well. And it's something that
3 we're feeling out right now because it's working.

4 If you have a problem, you come to your
5 representative and we have a chain of command and we will
6 deal with those problems. We will not put them aside.
7 Mr. Melton has done that. I have done that. I stepped in
8 when we lost --- when you lost yours and tried to settle
9 some problems that you had because we don't want to sit on
10 our duffs and not do anything. We are not picking sides.
11 We are not against you. We are a not. I don't care what
12 anybody says. If we're doing something wrong, let's
13 change it. We cannot beat on this dead horse forever.

14 "Look what you did; look what you did; look what you did."

15 Okay. If we did it let's fix it and let's
16 move on. Okay. You have you power, you are the board,
17 you are the members. We are your representatives. That's
18 what we are and that's what we stand for. Okay? And if
19 we're not doing our job, then there is replacement for us.
20 But we're trying the best that we can for everybody,
21 including you guys. You guys are not the enemy. I don't
22 car who's divided us or whatever. You are not. And if
23 something happens down there, we'll be there to take care
24 of it. We're dealing with a lot of prob- -- you guys are
25 a lot of problems. You really are, but we've taken on

1 that challenge to fix them.

2 UNIDENTIFIED AUDIENCE MEMBER: Yup, you
3 bought us.

4 MR. JACQUEZ: Yeah. We knew what we got
5 into.

6 UNIDENTIFIED AUDIENCE MEMBER: Exactly.

7 MR. JACQUEZ: Okay. We knew what we got
8 into and we're not backing up from solving those problems.
9 Okay? But we're start -- we're stuck with regs. The
10 sewer plants leak. You've got a break. The tank. The
11 well. Oh, my God. Let it stop. Okay? And we've stepped
12 in and taken care of it. Something happens at midnight,
13 somebody is down there taking care of it. And that's us.
14 That's Dona Ana Water. We don't say, "If it's Picacho
15 Hills don't show up until 5:00 in the morning." No, we're
16 there and I dare anybody to say that we're not trying to
17 do the best that we can to make it better.

18 If you've got a problem with it, we all have
19 a problem with it. And if we have to vote down
20 districting, then we'll vote it down as a membership or
21 keep it as a membership with a vote. Okay? We have a
22 procedure in place. Please don't make it seem like we're
23 a bunch of idiots because we're not. We're dealing and
24 trying to do the best that we can. If you think we did
25 something wrong, fine. Mr. Crowley, if you've got a

1 problem, you come see me. We'll set up a committee and
2 we'll take care of things.

3 MR. CROWLEY: I will.

4 MR. JACQUEZ: Come see me. But you haven't.
5 And do it now and I will be glad to sit with you and
6 anybody else to come up with resolutions to keep everybody
7 happy and running smooth. And that's a promise.

8 MR. STRAMIELLO: My name is Tom Stramiello
9 and I'm from Butterfield One. We had the unfortunate
10 situation in that all of our systems are on septic tanks.
11 And of course when we got the request for membership, it
12 read something like you better -- if you don't pay for the
13 sewers, we're going to sue you and also it said we have
14 the authority to hook you to the sewer system. Well, I
15 looked at that and I said I know what that is. Apparently
16 the top of that message said the National Bureau of
17 Agriculture wrote this book and you-all just adopted it
18 and you didn't realize that we had septic tanks and so
19 I -- I called and told them, "We've got septic tanks. We
20 can't hook up to your sewer." And pretty soon you send us
21 another document and it said just disregard all that stuff
22 that says sewers in it and go ahead and sign it and it
23 seems like it worked beautifully. And I appreciate what
24 you guys did because it was hard. You had to -- you
25 couldn't actually know that we had sewers or wells or what

1 we had and so when you sent those papers out, you just
2 sent out to everybody. But when you realized how it
3 worked, you solved it and I appreciate that.

4 MR. HAYHOE: Mr. Chair, I'm Jim Hayhoe,
5 member. I would just like to respond to a couple of
6 comments that you made.

7 There has not been one negative word
8 expressed that I have heard in the four months that we've
9 been here that you guys have not responded technically.
10 Technically and operationally I give you a lot, a lot of
11 credit. Obviously what it boils down to is we have a lot
12 of problems in communication and a lot of problems in
13 issues perceived from our side from customer service.
14 Those things can be resolved and I think you've opened the
15 door and maybe allow us to be able to have the opportunity
16 to have those discussions.

17 I do want to clarify one point. You
18 indicated that we have not tried to reach out as far as
19 getting any information on how to help the Picacho
20 residents who are not members. I have attended several of
21 the meetings. I have asked for the list. I finally got
22 the list yesterday and we have already started a small
23 group to work to start helping you guys to resolve those
24 particular issues because there are special issues. Okay?
25 But please feel free to know that we are supportive of you

1 technically and operational.

2 MR. JACQUEZ: Thank you. Thank you.

3 And again it's the problems that we've had.
4 We had them with Fort Selden also. We extended deadlines.
5 We did everything. We tried just to communicate and make
6 sure everything -- all the paperwork. We're just trying
7 to do the legal part of it and make sure everybody has
8 situated. Thank you.

9 Yes, ma'am.

10 MS. HANSEN: My name is Paula Hansen. I am
11 a member. And I'm not in -- in any way trying to attempt
12 any defensive action up here. I have a suggestion. One
13 of the issues that we know, it is our understanding, there
14 is a new billing and accounting software system that has
15 been approved and passed to vote on in December 10th at a
16 regular board meeting and implementation and availability
17 should occur some time this year. In the interim we also
18 recognize there have been numerous voices of concern about
19 billing issues.

20 MR. JACQUEZ: Hold your microphone up.

21 MS. HANSEN: Thank you.

22 One of the suggestions I have is in some
23 regular format to identify to the owners, all of us, the
24 number of bills being challenged, the process of review
25 that you're using, the corrective actions required and

1 what's been resolved. If everybody just talks about the
2 problem they have and there's no discussion of what has
3 been done and resolved, then we can't carry a positive
4 attitude and see a movement going forward. If we know
5 that there's work going on and actions occurring that --
6 yes, some will take longer than others to get done, but at
7 least we know there's movement and that provides a more
8 positive tone to all of the rest of us that are hearing
9 things and allows us to interact in your behalf.

10 MR. JACQUEZ: Thank you. Clarification.
11 Invite us to your meeting. We'll do the best that we can.
12 You know, I pass this mic around, but I pass it because we
13 look for the most qualified people that we know. And
14 we've done some very good choices as a -- as a board
15 member. That's why it doesn't embarrass me to go,
16 "Jennifer? Lee?" or anybody. Because we're trying to be
17 responsible. We're trying to get it right. Okay? If you
18 have questions, if you have one of your meetings say, "Mr.
19 Chairman, David, can you and Jennifer come by and talk to
20 us? We have some questions for you," glad to do it. I
21 will.

22 Jennifer? Lee? Oh, not Lee. We have to
23 pay him so -- glad to take him. Glad to take him. And
24 again that's part of communication. That's part of us
25 being a part of you and you have questions and we have

1 questions on procedures and actions that we take. We'll
2 be glad to discuss them, they're not secret. They're not
3 secret at all.

4 Miss? It's 15 -- 16 after.

5 MS. RICHARDSON: Okay. My name is Susan
6 Richardson and I am a member. And you see, people, this
7 is called growing too fast and growing pains. And in the
8 last 15 minutes, with the last three people speaking they,
9 did it in such a way that it opened up communication
10 lines. The rest of the other part of the meeting was a
11 bunch of chaos and people getting upset and pointing
12 fingers and you don't get anywhere with pointing fingers.
13 Do you? Okay? These poor people are trying their best.
14 Remember we are all people. We're not robots. We do
15 fail. We do not communicate always. On both sides of the
16 table, we've got issues, we've got legal issues, we've got
17 personal issues, we've got billing issues, we've got this
18 issue, we've got septic tank issues. We've got issues.
19 But if you do it in such a way that it doesn't offend
20 somebody or put them on the defensive, you get a lot more
21 done. You get a lot more cooperation. You get a lot more
22 everything. Okay? This poor man had to, in the last half
23 an hour, basically be on the defensive, going, "Okay.
24 Where am I going to be attacked now. Okay. Who's next?
25 Who's going to" -- okay. The same thing with all these

1 people. Okay? You've been dealing with issues, but you
2 haven't been communicating them and if you don't
3 communicate, you don't get anywhere. So what I would
4 suggest is that the next meeting, you write down all your
5 stuff, you get in in your head and you do it in such a way
6 that you don't attack each other and you work with each
7 other and this is how you get through growing pains.
8 Thank you.

9 MR. JACQUEZ: Thank you, ma'am.

10 MR. ALLEN: Michael Allen, still a member.

11 I hope you didn't hear my criticism, and it
12 was a criticism, of the services provided having to relate
13 to those fine men back there in the blue shirts who keep
14 my water running and my sewer running. Because you-all
15 are doing a good job, guys. My problems have been with
16 what I perceive is a culture that's more oriented towards
17 paperwork than people work. When I called and said, "I
18 didn't get my water bill. You've charged me a late fee,"
19 I was told, "That's your fault. You should have called us
20 and let us know that you didn't get your bill." It's like
21 everyone who's not here, raise your hand. It just doesn't
22 make sense. So work harder, get a stronger board and
23 recognize that the challenges have increased tenfold. New
24 ways.

25 MR. JACQUEZ: I challenge you to get

1 stronger members that care and are involved.

2 MR. ALLENS: Don't blame me.

3 MR. JACQUEZ: No, no, no. No. Hey, that's
4 a compliment. That's a compliment, please.

5 UNIDENTIFIED AUDIENCE MEMBER: We're here.

6 MS. PHILLIPSON: My name's Kathy Phillipson
7 and I would just like to say "thank you." On Christmas
8 night, with 22 people in the house, I had a flood and when
9 I called Roto-Rooter, they said it wasn't actually my
10 fault, it was in the sewer. And it turns out that the
11 sewer had not -- that the sewer drain had not even been
12 touched in 30-some-odd years. So I want to say thank you
13 because everything works.

14 MS. CAPLING: My name is Martha Capling. I
15 am here representing, apparently, my husband Stuart
16 Capling, because his name is on as a member and mine is
17 not. I am a little concerned.

18 UNIDENTIFIED AUDIENCE MEMBER: Hold the mic
19 up.

20 MS. CAPLING: I'm sorry. Let me just read
21 what I have written here.

22 As individual members of Dona Ana Water
23 company who own multiple properties within your district,
24 we are restricted, according to your bylaws, to one and
25 only one vote even though we pay more than one bill. I am

1 just wondering is that fair?

2 UNIDENTIFIED AUDIENCE MEMBER: No.

3 MS. CAPLING: That is my question.

4 MR. JACQUEZ: May be an issue that needs to
5 brought up to the membership.

6 UNIDENTIFIED AUDIENCE MEMBER: No. What do
7 you mean maybe?

8 MR. JACQUEZ: What did you ask?

9 UNIDENTIFIED AUDIENCE MEMBER: I said what
10 do you mean maybe? Address it.

11 MS. CAPLING: I might have heard someone say
12 this evening -- correct me if I'm wrong -- it doesn't
13 matter if you have 30 properties, you only are going to
14 have one vote. Did I hear that?

15 AUDIENCE: Yes.

16 MS. CAPLING: Okay. I rest my -- my point
17 is made.

18 UNIDENTIFIED AUDIENCE MEMBER: We handle it
19 the same way at Lower Rio Grande. Just because you have
20 more money to own more properties doesn't give you the
21 right to have more votes.

22 MR. JACQUEZ: I have two properties; I have
23 one vote.

24 Okay. But, you know, it's something that we
25 need to discuss, guys. You know, we're running out of

1 time. We need to come back to the agenda on the minutes
2 of November 7th. Okay? Is that agreeable. Are we
3 through with the comments? You know what? If we'd had
4 done this at the start, I think, and aired out some
5 things, we'd have gone through this agenda probably in 30
6 minutes. Next time we know better. We learned a lesson.
7 Okay?

8 (Audience discussion off the stenographic
9 record.)

10 MR. JACQUEZ: Okay. Let's get straight,
11 Mr. Lee.

12 MR. PETERS: The group voted to hear public
13 input before considering with finality the approval of the
14 minutes of the November 7, 2013, meeting. So we are back
15 on the motion to approve those minutes as was originally
16 made before the group pushed this past the public input
17 part of the agenda.

18 MR. JACQUEZ: So what do we need?

19 MR. PETERS: We need more discussion.

20 MR. JACQUEZ: Okay. We're running out of
21 time here. Okay. We'll call for a vote? Okay. And the
22 call is for the November 7th meeting.

23 For clarification purposes there was a
24 motion to amend to add the adopted bylaw amendment --
25 amendments and the article amendment that were made at the

1 November 7 meeting to the minutes. So that's the motion
2 before you is to approve the minutes with those documents
3 added. A "yes" vote approves the minutes, a "no" vote
4 disapproves them or -- well, does not approve them.

5 UNIDENTIFIED AUDIENCE MEMBER: Who made the

8 MR. JACQUEZ: Okay. "Yes" approves the --
9 the minutes. "Yes" stand.

10 (Audience discussion off the stenographic
11 record.)

12 MR. JACQUEZ: Okay. We've still got the
13 quorum. Did you count up front, Jen?

14 MS. HORTON: Okay. We're good.

15 MR. JACQUEZ: Okay. Against. Please stand.

16 (Audience discussion off the stenographic
17 record.)

18 MR. JACQUEZ: Okay. We have a count.
19 Right?

20 MS. HORTON: 32; 27.

21 "Yeses" have it.

22 MR. JACQUEZ: What?

23 MS. HORTON: 32 "yes;" 27 "no."

24 MR. JACQUEZ: 32 "yes;" 37 --

(Meeting adjourned at 9:29 p.m.)

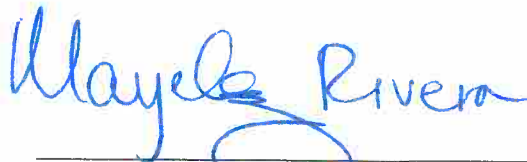
